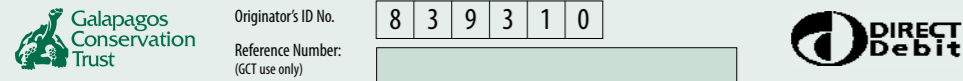

"Even though Galapagos is recognised as one of the best preserved archipelagos in the world, due to the consequences of human intervention, many species are now threatened with extinction. With prompt and holistic action however, Galapagos can provide a model of sustainability for the world."

Indirect pressure from tourism, introduced species like mosquitoes and rats, over-exploitation of the Galapagos Marine Reserve and development and pollution from an increasing human population are all threats which the Galapagos Islands are facing right now. Diseases like avian pox are just one of several major threats to the Islands' bird life.

But what is the future for this beautiful archipelago with its unique wildlife? It is our duty – humanity's duty – to ensure the survival of Galapagos.

With your help we can continue our work and save this jewel of evolution

The Galapagos Conservation Trust funds local conservation projects, like the Giant Tortoise programmes, as well as whole ecosystem and island restoration. We also help control and prevent the introduction of invasive species which pose the greatest threat to the Islands' unique flora and fauna. Thanks to this work feral goats have now been successfully removed across the archipelago.

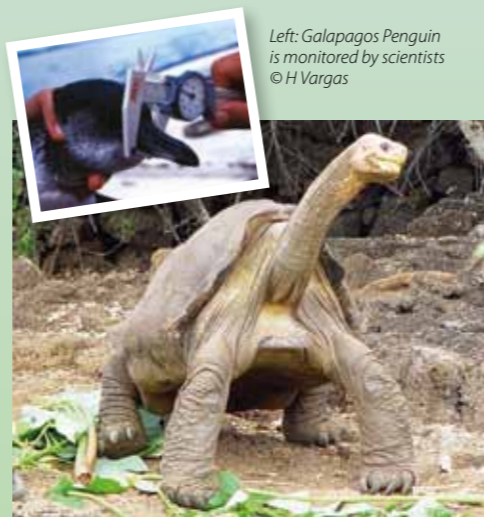
Protecting the Galapagos Marine Reserve and the magnificent fish, seabirds and animals that live there is another priority for GCT. Managing the human impact is critical. Our education projects on the Islands are helping local people to understand the value of wildlife and how to live sustainably. We also raise awareness in the UK of both the threats to Galapagos and how much Galapagos can teach the world.

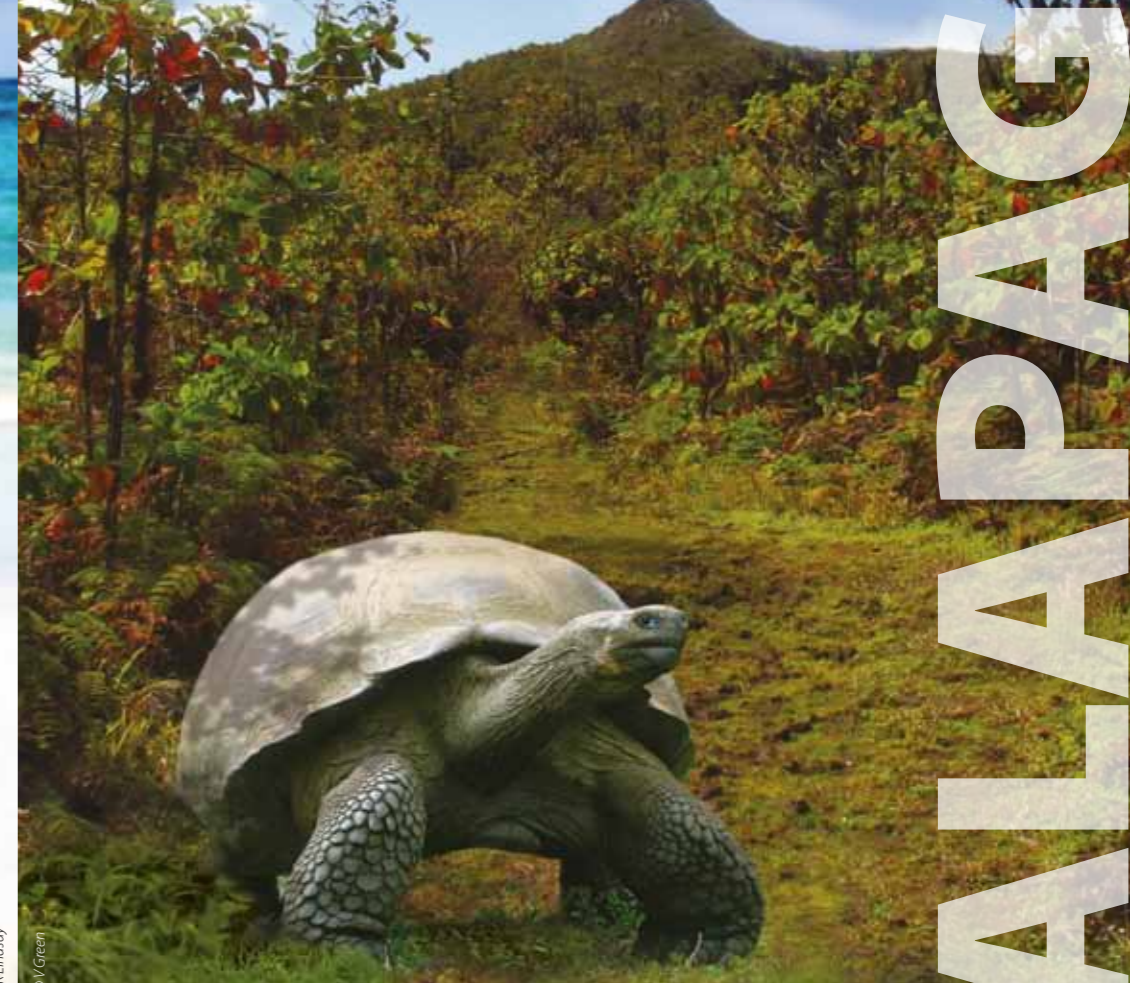

GALAPAGOS UNDER THREAT

This unique and beautiful Pacific archipelago, 600 miles off the coast of Ecuador, was the inspiration for Charles Darwin's historic theory of evolution. The remoteness of Galapagos has resulted in an evolutionary explosion of plant and animal life found nowhere else on our planet. From the famous Galapagos Giant Tortoises and Marine Iguanas to the cactus forests, the Galapagos Sharks and Sea Lions, the archipelago truly deserves Herman Melville's description as 'The Enchanted Islands'.

A unique and diverse array of life

The Galapagos Islands have been described as a living laboratory. There are over 1,300 known endemic species (unique to Galapagos) inhabiting the archipelago. The Islands are also a haven for many more species. Galapagos has the world's highest concentration of Nazca Boobies and over 30% of the endangered Blue-footed Booby population live here. Waved Albatross nest almost exclusively in Galapagos.

The surrounding Galapagos Marine Reserve is one of the world's largest protected marine areas and a World Heritage Site in its own right. Home to the iconic Galapagos Penguin, 30 species of shark and over 500 species of fish and coral, it also plays host to 22 species of whales at different times of year. Bright red Sally Lightfoot Crabs and playful Galapagos Sea Lions can usually be seen along the shoreline.

Galapagos also has a rich array of plant life – from cacti to forests of Scalesia daisy trees. There are over 500 native plant species but sadly these are now outnumbered by over 800 introduced species. 95% of the original biodiversity still remains, but it faces mounting threats. We must act now to protect this beautiful but fragile habitat for future generations of wildlife – and humanity – to enjoy.

DIRECT DEBIT GUARANTEE. This guarantee should be retained by the payer.

The Guarantee is offered by all banks and building societies that accept instructions to pay Direct Debits. - If there are any changes to the amount, date or frequency of your Direct Debit, Galapagos Conservation Trust will notify you (normally 10 working days) in advance of your account being debited or as otherwise agreed. If you request the Galapagos Conservation Trust to collect a payment, confirmation of the amount and date will be given to you at the time of the request. - If an error is made in the payment of your Direct Debit, by Galapagos Conservation Trust or your bank or building society, you are entitled to a full and immediate refund of the amount paid from your bank or building society. - If you receive a refund you are not entitled to, you must pay it back when Galapagos Conservation Trust asks you to. - You can cancel a Direct Debit at any time by simply contacting your bank or building society. Written confirmation may be required. Please also notify Galapagos Conservation Trust.
